

UPDATE

Regarding the Waukegan WW2 Event

The June 12, 13,14 2015 Salute the Armed Forces "
Then and Now Breakout from Carentan Battle
Reenactment HAS NOT BEEN canceled. It will no
longer, however, be held at the originally proposed
site in Waukegan, Illinois. The reason for this is that
the Waukegan Park District late in the planning
process was requiring a rental fee of \$14,000 for use
of the site. As one of the main goals of the event was
to be a fundraiser for the "Salute the Armed Forces
Charity Organization" this cost was not possible to
accept.

We have been actively looking for an alternative location in Northeastern, Illinois and are negotiating with a couple agencies regarding the use of their property. As a result in the change in venue this year's event will not include an improved battle field.

The event will still include period aircraft, pyrotechnics etc., etc. The event will include major involvement by the U.S. military as one of the major contributors to the event is the U.S. Army Chicago Area recruiting battalion. Heavy Amour and vehicle transportation will be provided by various National Guard and Reserve transportation units. A reenactor registration website is anticipated to be open mid-March 2015 with more specific additional information on the event.

WWII reenactors Give students historical experience

RACINE — As about 135 elementary and middle school students boisterously found seats in the auditorium at Jerstad-Agerholm Wednesday afternoon, they grew quiet and attentive when two men in unusual military garb began to introduce themselves.

The two men, and eventually a third — wearing the clothes and equipment typical for German and American soldiers during World War II — would spend the next hour showing the students what soldiers in that war dealt with on a daily basis.

The men — Robert Starr Sr., 67, of Caledonia, his son Robert Starr Jr., 45, of Caledonia, and Tyler Stevens, 22, of Crystal Lake, Illinois — are re-enactors who devote their free time to educating the public about World War II by helping make an interactive experience of the period. "People need to know the history of what it took to get our country to where it is at today," said the younger Starr, who was dressed as a U.S. paratrooper. "We are here today because of what our history, our veterans did to get us where we are at today."

In its third year, the presentation comes as a group of seventh-graders at Jerstad-Agerholm Middle School, 3601 LaSalle St., is finishing the novel "Soldier Boys" by Dean Hughes, according to Sandy Faulkner, a special education teacher who organized the visit. The book documents the experiences of two young soldiers — one German and one American — who eventually meet during the Battle of the Bulge in December 1944.

The Starrs dressed as and spoke to the experiences of American soldiers and Stevens did the same as a German soldier, all three in the uniforms that some of their relatives would have worn during the war. They explained that they travel hours sometimes to participate in living history re-enactments, not just to experience what their relatives faced, but also to pass on that understanding to others, especially children. "This kept someone warm," said Starr Jr., picking up a U.S. Army blanket from the period. "You can feel how itchy it is, how thick it is, how warm it is ... that's what I like. More people will treasure and learn history through touch than reading it, is how I look at it." Faulkner, who has also been participating in World War II reenactments for more than a decade, explained that the conflict is being covered less and less in school, and students only begin to get that history in ninth grade. She conceived of the project to give students an earlier introduction to the time period.

"I hope that they continue wanting to know more," she said. "It sparks interest in kids and they'll be asking me questions for the rest of this year and probably into next year ... that's the goal: to make them want to know more."

Many of you have probably heard the old saying "use the right tool for the right job." Well that can be applied to many aspects in life as well as to our very own hobby of military reenacting. Our hobby affords us the chance to take part in events all across the nation. These events often have a diverse set of venues. Not every event is for every re-enactor and that is something we all must learn to deal with in this hobby. If you are pretty sure that an event is not going to be your cup of tea then stay away from it and find something else to do or someplace else to go. Trash talking an event and or attending an event with the intention to cause mayhem does none of us any good.

However, from time to time we may find ourselves at an event that was not exactly as advertised. Maybe it is a situation where Mother Nature has decided to make things interesting with extreme weather or site conditions. Perhaps some fellow re-enactors are at the event with whom you don't get along with. So what do you do? Well you have two choices. You can either pack up and head back home or stick it out and see if you can salvage the weekend. If you decide to stick it out you do have a certain responsibility to make an honest attempt to make it work. This is not only for your own sake but for the sake of your fellow re-enactors and the public who are coming to the event.

I have attended all sorts of events from the local county fair to air shows to official ceremonies, etc. Some of these adventures had the potential of being the worst experiences in my re-enacting career. This was due to a variety of reasons. Some were due to the weather while others were due to the presence of others whom I had issues with. In some cases it was the venue of the event itself. Have you ever done a battle in on the infield of a dirt race track? I have. LOL! It actually turned out to be a neat experience. I know that all of you have had similar experiences at one time or another in the hobby.

After 31 years of re-enacting I have found the key to my enjoyment and or survival of these events had a lot to do with my positive attitude as well as the positive attitude of my fellow re-enactors. Some of those "potentially worst events ever" turned out to be some of the most fun and most memorable events due to a positive attitude displayed by those who were at the event. I have experienced some of the worst weather conditions a person can endure and still be able to laugh about it later because my pards and I maintained a positive selfattitude. A positive self-attitude has carried me and my pards through some of the worst event venues you can imagine. I have learned how to be civil and work in a professional manner with those whom I have differences in re-enacting philosophy. Never underestimate the power of a smile, a good joke, and words of encouragement or civil treatment towards your fellow re-enactor in times of distress. It can make a big difference and the rewards can be amazing.

The demographics of our hobby are as diverse as the rest of the general population. The reasons which have drawn each of us to this hobby are numerous and diverse. We need to remember that none of the reasons are any more noble or valid than any other reason. Some members like firearms while others are honoring a relative or Veterans. The love of history draws others to our ranks while some just like to dress up and hang out with the guys to get away from the family. Many are current or former military who like the comradery they experienced in the military. I joined the hobby at age 14 as a way to not only escape the reality of the bitter divorce of my parents but also take my love of military history to a new level that books and movies could not equal. Like I said we all have our reasons. Mine are no better or no worse than any other.





Another thing to remember is we are the ambassadors not only of military history and our hobby to the public whether we like it or not. So the way we present ourselves to and how we conduct ourselves around the public has an impact on how good or bad their experience is going to be at an event. So needless to say it is more than just about us and our quest for enjoyment and fulfillment. Some of the simplest acts of kindness can make a big difference. For example: I was at an event where it rained heavily and made the site a mud bog. It was really bad. I noticed a family had made the long trek of 200 yards through nasty mud from the nice hard road clear out to our Soviet camp. A little boy was crying while he and his sister were struggling to navigate through the mud in our camp. The mom and dad were clearly distressed by the discomfort of their kids so I decided to see if I could help. So I offered to give them a jeep ride from our camp back to the hard road. The kids stopped crying and had big smiles on their faces and the parents were elated with the ride and profusely thanked me for the lift.

So the next time you find yourself at an event that isn't quite up to your expectations. Please take a moment to realize that your attitude can make or break the event not only for you but those around you. Life is too short to spend it being upset so why not smile and enjoy the ride.

OUR WORST NIGHTMARE

A man was wounded during a $\overline{WW2}$ reenactment 7 February 2015

A WW2 Re-enactment in Texas turned tragic when a reenactor was wounded with live ammunition.

The first battle of the day was underway when a cease fire was called. All reenactors were ordered to stop where they were and put their weapons on the ground with chambers open.

A German reenactor received an injury to the stomach from a live round. He was transported by ambulance to a Hospital. Scott Fullerton, a man in his forties from the Dallas area, had suffered from a bullet wound to the stomach area. Scott is in stable condition and can be seen on video talking about his injury.

Fort Richardson State Park Superintendent Robert Frie reported that park services had inspected all ammunition and weapons to be used in the reenactment that morning. Everything that was inspected at 9 a.m. was crimped, blank ammo.

Jacksboro, Texas Police Department, Jack County Sheriff's Office and park officials are investigating this incident.

This tragic event did not occur at a WW2 HRS Event, but the WW2 HRS is talking about this incident and what can be done to better prevent this from happening at one of our events.
